## Nicaraguan communists threaten U.S.

Lenin once said, "The road to victory over capitalism runs through Mexico City." The United States is at the end of that road -and Nicaragua is closer to Texas than Washington

The Nicaraguan government has seized control of all media except one heavily-censored newspaper. It denied Roman Catholic priests the right to say Mass on television during Holy Week. It has stifled the private sector and independent trade unions. It has driven the Miskito Indians out of their homelands, while burning their villages, destroying their crops, and forcing them into

As former U.S. United Nations Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick stated, "Everyone who cares to know now understands that the government of Nicaragua has imposed new dictatorship."

Robert Leiken, editor of Central America: Anatomy of a Conflict, testified before Congress against aid to the Contras. After a recent visit he stated, "One of the most depressing aspects of our trip was to hear from so many that their lives are worse today than they were at the time of Somoza. Before the revolution Nicaraguans ate well by Central American standards.'

The Sandinistas blame Nicaragua's economic crisis on the Contra war. Yet a December 1981 internal staff memorandum of the International Monetary Fund found that real wages had fallen 71 percent since July 1979 and have continued to decline. The economic crisis can actually be blamed on the Sandanista government.

Nicaragua's rulers have introduced into the country thousands of Cuban teachers, trainers and supervisors, including at least 2,000 military advisers. The Sandinista rulers have denied their international supporters the comforts of ambiguity. They have announced their principles, "We guide ourselves by the scientific doctrines of the Revolution, by Marxism-Leninism."



### Numbers about gays

It is important for students to be aware of homosexuality. The average homosexual has about 500 (usually anonymous) sex partners in his lifetime.


Only two percent of the U.S. population is homosexual, another two percent are bisexual. However, 72 percent of AIDS, 35 percent of hepatitis, 51 percent of gonorrhea (throat), and 53 percent of intestinal infections reside within this 4 percent of our population. If statistics are meaningful, homosexuals are 15 times more likely to commit murder than heterosexuals, so says Dr. Paul Cameron, chairperson for the Institute for the Scientific Investigation of Sexuality. Dr. Cameron believes that homosexual relationships are particularly prone to physical violence.

I highly recommend that students become better informed about homosexuality before they fund it with their money. There are several good books on the subject: The Homosexual Network by Enrique Rueda, Homosexual Politics by Dr. Ed Rowe, The Unhappy Gays by Tim LaHaye, The Homosexual Revolution by David A. Noebel.
