However, things looked bad for the event when a the state attorney general's office obtained a court order Tuesday afternoon, shutting down the benefit.

Later Tuesday, the restraining order was revised, allowing the singers to go on stage, but the funds are being held pending a

ruling on the case.

The funds, approximately \$3,000 worth, are being held by G&B Select-a-Seat, Clark said.

Clark said Blossom had not made arrangements for distribution of the money through any known charitable organizations.

According to the World AIDS Day information booklet, AIDS is the sixth leading cause of death among people aged 15 to 24

However, AIDS is the number one cause of death in 64 cities in the U.S. Martin said.

Approximately 18,500 children have lost their mothers to AIDS. By the year 2000 it is estimated that 80,000 children will lose

their mother's to AIDS, Martin said.

She is targeting the high school age students to try and prevent the spread of AIDS through education.

Ely pointed out that high school students are not going to


The group then lit candles in front of the CUB and shared words for those victims and those who will be victims of the AIDS epidemic.

Ruby Bailey Ronald

Ruby Bailey Ronald, an associate music professor at WSU, was killed in a single-car accident near Ellensburg, Wash., Nov. 27. She was 57 years old.

Born Aug. 17, 1936 in Peru, Ill., Ronald completed her primary education in the Peru School District. After graduating high school in 1954, she received a four-year scholarship at the Eastman School of Music where she received her _bachelor's degree, specializing in piano.

Ronald started teaching at WSU in 1972, soon after receiving her master's degree in music from the university. In 1978 she was elevated to assistant professor. Ronald was promoted to associate professor in 1992, coordinating the instruction of keyboard, class piano and accompanying. "She was always trying to behind the find out what was behind the notes," Gerald Berthiaume, a friend and music faculty member, said. "She always worked with people who could help her find that. ... She was just a ball of fire."
