New class offered again spring semester

High notes, shimmering vibratos, emotional scenes and torrid love affairs are the norm for any opera ---and a particular WSU class.

Opera Workshop, offered by the School of Music and Theater Arts, will be holding a performance of various 20th century American opera scenes Tuesday, under the direction of Julie Wieck.

Wieck decided on the 20th century American composers because of the style of music.

"The music is more popular and easier for the students to sing," she said.

Since this is her first year teaching at WSU, Wieck did not know what to expect from the voices she would be working with, she said.

Although some directors choose many short scenes, Wieck decided to have fewer scenes, each lasting about

15 minutes.

"Short scenes may be more interesting for the audience, but the longer scenes give the students the opportunity to develop their characters," she said.

Wieck feels an opera workshop program should not only teach students how to

develop stage presence and movement, but give them the chance to investigate operatic roles as well.

Starting out with a wide range of operas, Wieck narrowed the performance down to four, each dealing with possible stages of a relationship between a man and a woman.

"Street Scene," by Kurt Weill, will be the first excerpt performed, featuring eight cast members. Revolving primarily around characters Danny Buchanan and Anna Maurrant, in this scene Danny sings of the trials of impending fatherhood while neighborhood women laugh at his hervous antics. Anna then sings about the joy of pregnancy and childbirth and the previous troubles she has endured.

Anna is "an eternal optimist," said Shelby Davis, who will be performing the role. Anna wants life to be beautiful and easy, but reality is intruding, she said.


face each day. The combination of singing and acting is a treat for either the seasoned theatergoer or those who have never attended.
