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been an active member in recruitment of women for ROTC in the past.

Carlson, who is Asian-American, preferred to focus on her interpersonal relationships as part of improving diversity.

Robinson cited his recent sponsorship of ASWSU Senate Bill 25-26, the bill which eventually granted the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual Association (GLBA) committee status.

Robinson was very confident and relentless about his commitment to diversity throughout the entire evening.

"When it comes to diversity, I don't just talk the talk, I walk the walk," Robinson said.

Robinson also said, "We need to stop doing what's popular, and start doing what's right," in reference to the negative letters and comments senators received following the passage of Bill 25-26.

Robinson was asked later exactly what he thought was "right," but never gave a definite answer.

Talk then shifted to gay student groups in general, and how the candidates feel on them.

"The important thing here is that every student at WSU feels at home, that they feel they are safe," Carlson said.

"I believe diversity only adds to and improves are education," Robinson said. He also said the teaching of tolerance begins at a very young age, and once again referred to teaching children "what's right."

Kreidler again stressed awareness.

As the evening drew on, Robinson continued his tough talk on other issues such as the dry campus legislation, which would make it illegal for any student, regardless of age, to possess and/or consume alcohol in university housing.

"Anything that infringes on students rights, be they 18, 21 or 30 is not acceptable to me," Robinson said, and suggested students speak out

with their vote come election time in November.

Kreidler said she and friends have written letters to their representative in opposition to dry campus legislation.

Carlson said she advocates the current system of designated dry residence halls. "If you are 21 you are of the legal age to drink and should be able to do so," Carlson said.

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not discussed before," Franz Maish said. "But I think it was tough for the professors to talk about the issues."

More student involvement will encourage a more open dialogue since students don't have administration "hanging over their head," Maish said.

they were telling the truth, Strayer said.

The program should be more inclusive of the other cultures on campus, Maish said.
