University research lab vandalized

BELLINGHAM — Offices were vandalized and four rabbits and 37 white rats were taken from a laboratory at Western Washington University, and campus police said animal-rights activists apparently were responsible.

"There was spray paint on walls, computer screens, things like that. It talked about vegan power, or vegetarian power, and it was signed or initialed 'ALF,'" a possible reference to the Animal Liberation Front, said Dave Doughty, assistant chief of the campus police.

In the same building, Miller Hall, offices belonging to a laboratory technician and a professor who does animal research were ransacked and vandalized, Doughty said.






About \$3,000 damage was done, and the animals were worth about \$770, he estimated.

Despite the spray-painted ALF initials, officials could not be certain the damage was done by the Animal Liberation Front, Doughty said.

ALF members believe research on animals is unethical, and the group has been implicated in a number of break-ins around the country.

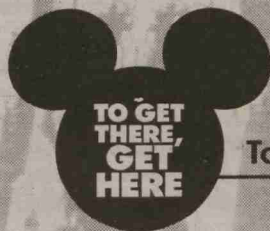
The animals taken were used for behavioral research, Psychology Department Chair Ron Kleinknecht said.

Such a raid "is not justified in any way," WWU President Karen Morse said in a release. "Animal research is an integral part of the research process, and we at Western comply completely with all oversight regulations."
