## Police will tow away parked cars

More than 60,000 parking tickets were issued on campus last year, and that is too many, according to Del Brannan, campus police chief.

This school year, about 25 illegally parked cars have been towed away to deter the chronic illegal parkers. Brannan said any car with an "excessive number of tickets" against it will be put on an impound list.

Brannan said the impound policy started because he felt people should not be able to avoid paying and be able to park anywhere they wanted. He said one student told him he intended to pay for all the tickets he accumulated, but he did not like where he was supposed to park.

"I can see it (illegal parking) in an emergency situation or if a sign was missed, but he warned that more than two tickets a year, regardless of whether the tickets are paid, may cause that vehicle to be put on the impound list.

He said the department is going after cars with more than \$50 of tickets against them, and once a car is on the list it will stay there the rest of the year.

"There are a few cars that seem to accumulate a large number of tickets and this seems to go on and on. They park at the same place, time and day of the week. It's obvious the parking tickets are being ignored," he said.

If a car is towed away, the driver is liable not only for the parking ticket, but for the towing charges as well.

Brannan emphasized the policy is not meant to generate more revenue, but to force compliance with the parking ordinances. He also said anyone with a complaint about being towed should go to the police, and not to the towing company.

"It's not revenue, it's compliance we are worried about. The university is not designed to survive on parking ticket revenue.

"Lots of people complain about the parking problem, but no one seems to have a solution. I don't believe one exists that would make everybody happy. All you can do is try to make it the best for the majority," he said.

Brannan invited anyone who thinks he may have a solution to the problem to talk
