bia," said Rob Painter-Johnson, a graduate student in history who was previously a graduate assistant in the GLBA Center.

According to the study, gay, lesbian or bisexual students at WSU are consequential to the type of college experience one has at the school, and the college experience is not limited to the classroom.

It also states when gay, lesbian or bisexual individuals are harassed with regard to sexual orientation, this harassment limits these students' participation on and off campus.

"Homophobia is hard to trace, it depends on who you talk to and the setting you are in," said Amy Burns, a junior majoring in women's studies and comparative American cultures.

"In certain situations, I have expected (homophobia) many times but it is not a big deal to many people, other times you get it when it is unexpected," she said.

The scope of "homophobia on campus are little things that build up over time," Gallagher said. "There aren't a lot of overt incidents of homophobia, but there is a lot of dialogue in the (Evergreen) and it is like a grinding effect, and (it is) totally exhausting," she said.

To help change the attitudes regarding homosexuality on campus bonace requested Sam Smith, president of WSU write a welcoming letter for the participants in the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transsexual, and Transgendered Youth Conference, but nothing came out of it, Jenness said.

Sam Smith was away on business and unavailable for comment.

"I think WSU is walking the walk, but not talking the talk" regarding the issue of homophobia on campus, bonace said.

"Right now it takes a lot of courage, and this institution isn't doing the job to combat homophobia," she said. "People are afraid of what they don't know, or afraid of being accused of (homosexuality)."

Burns said "the university isn't really taking enough initiative and in some ways perpetuating (homophobia) by not taking action."

The numbers of violent acts toward homosexuals are hard to judge because most victims don't report the incidents, bonace said.

"If the university is going to highlight diversity, we should make sure we do it," bonace said.

he said. The groups must then explain their case to the rest of the class, developing communication skills, Prieur said. Veterinary students must have the group and client communication skills, Prieur said.

"After students graduate, they almost all work in groups," he said. Students perform the diagnostic challenges twice in the fall and once in the spring semester, Prieur said.

"The students really like it," Hines said. "It is an unknown case, they figure out why and what to do."

Hines, along with the WSU Veterinary School also won a creativity in teaching award in 1995, receiving \$25,000, he said. They have established an endowment for creativity in teaching, Hines said. They will add any future monetary awards to the endowment.

The WSU veterinary school graduates about 65 students a year, Hines said. Because of Oregon State University's lack of resources, the WSU program also cooperates with OSU, he said.

OSU-cooperative students complete the first and fourth years, then return to WSU for the second and third years of the program, Hines said.
