## Caires speaks for same-sex marriage, no tuition increase

I would like to address a number of issues that have come up during the present legislative session in Olympia which will affect the students at WSU.

A great deal of my time this semester as ASWSU President has been spent focusing on legislative issues, and I have spent a number of days in Olympia lobbing for student interests.

ASWSU has a clear legislative agenda during the session. The primary issues we are concerned with during this biennium's budget are tuition and financial aid rates for the next two years.

ASWSU has decided the "best financial aid is low tuition."

The Washington Student Lobby (WSL) has introduced a bill in the legislature (SB 5604) that would have no tuition increase for 1998-1999 and a tuition increase of 3 percent for 1999-2000.

ASWSU supports this bill and has dedicated a week-long campaign to it, during which 800 WSU students wrote postcards to the legislature to voice support for this legislation.

This bill is being sponsored by Representative Larry Sheahan and Senator Eugene Prince, both from the 9th legislative district, which represents WSU and Eastern Washington University.

The WSU Board of Regents and Administration have also supported SB 5604. However, the University of Washington Board of Regents and Administration have decided to endorse a 5 percent tuition increase for both upcoming academic years. We at ASWSU feel this increase is unjust and have been fighting against the proposed 5 percent tuition increase.

Senate Higher Education Chair Wood has introduced a bill to raise tuition 4 percent each year for the upcoming biennium as a compromise between the positions of WSU and UW.

ASWSU will continue to support SB 5604, which keeps tuition rates predictable and affordable for all students in Washington.

House Higher Education Chair Carlson has introduced a financial aid bill (HB 1851) to the legislature. Although ASWSU supports this bill, we have a number of concerns with it.

We will be encouraging a number of amendments to this bill, with the focus on meritorious student aid and aid to students of color.

WSL has also introduced legislation to put a student member on each Board of Regents in the State of Washington. ASWSU has voted to support this bill; however, I have a number of concerns with the present language within this bill.

As written, this bill will give the power to the governor of the state to nominate an "at large student, in good standing at the university" to the Board of Regents.

This concerns me because it takes the power of student representation from the student body and gives it to the governor. The students at WSU should demand the best student representation, especially to the governing board of the university.

The students should be the individuals who empower their student leaders, not the governor. This bill's present language does not give the students that opportunity. This bill is still sitting in the Senate Rules Committee.

Finally, both the House and Senate passed legislation banning samesex marriages in Washington.

Last week, Gov. Locke vetoed this legislation, and it has now returned to the House and Senate.


Although some students may say this legislation is not a student concern, I think that anytime a law is created which takes away fundamental civil rights, it is a student issue.

I support Governor Locke's decision to veto this legislation. I will not support any type of legislation which denies individuals the same basic rights as others because of their race, color, gender, ability, religion or sexual orientation.

ASWSU has taken a pro position on this legislation. I commend the leadership demonstrated by the senate on this issue.
