Meet the new first lady: Janie

Faced with increasing unpopularity at the polls, President Carter recently took another drastic step to change his tarnished image by undergoing a sex change operation.

Calling this "an effort to show the American people that anything can be done we put our hearts to," the new Ms. Carter, who now prefers Janie, explained to reporters at a rare Camp David press conference that she (or he) has now fulfilled his (or her) version of the American Dream.

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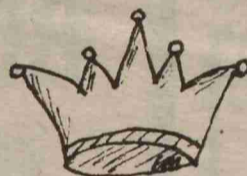
