# AWS may resort to drastic actions to fill posts

The Association for Women Students (AWS) may resort to "personal recruitment" if some positions are not filled by Friday for the upcoming ASWSU elec-tions, said Molly Whiteside, sen-

"People just don't know about AWS and some are just apathetic," Whiteside said.

Two candidates have filed for president. Candidates for secretary, and for the Greek, offcampus and at-large senate positions are running unopposed. No one has filed for vice president, treasurer or any of the three dorm senate positions.

Whiteside blames a "poor

campus" for the lack of knowledge about AWS and the elec-

AWS relies on public service announcements and the Daily Evergreen for its publicity. "There is nothing more available to us," Whiteside added.

'ASWSU has a fantastic budget for publicity while we (AWS) have a low publicity budget," she explained. "There are other more important things we'd prefer to spend the money on,' she added.

This year AWS decided to hold its elections with ASWSU rather than at a different time as in years past. It was hoped this switch would generate more publicity for AWS.

"The type of candidate we're looking for is somebody who has ideas of how things should be done, has an interest in AWS programs, has ideas on how to solve problems and wants to get involved in an organization, Whiteside said.

Each senator is apportioned a program. "I had a program I was running, that I was responsible for, very soon after I was elected," she added.

AWS programs include the Women's Center, the New Student Information Fair, the Black Women's Caucus, the Sex Resource Center, some coffeehouses and the sponsorship of

fees are allocated to AWS. Committees organized to run the programs submit budget requests to AWS who, in turn, re-allocate the S & A fees.

AWS candidates are not allowed to campaign. Brief resumes are available to voters at the polls. The resumes do not include the candidates' political views. "We don't want to discourage people from running just because they can't afford big signs," Whiteside said.

The Daily Evergreen also in-terviews all AWS candidates. "We depend a lot on the Evergreen's giving an unbiased view of the candidates, but we do not condone the endorsements, Whiteside said.

the Martin Stadium expansion project are waiting for a special type of bulldozer designed not to get stuck in mud before resuming work on the project

The project was halted two weeks ago when muddy conditions at the dump site for the dirt being removed from the stadium

A "swamp cat," which is a special type of bulldozer equipped with extra large treads for working in muddy conditions,

currently is waiting to clear Customs in Seattle so it can be transported to Pullman.

University officials were unable to locate a bulldozer with capabilities to work in heavy mud in the Eastern Washington area, so a new machine, just arriving from Japan, will do the

Bill Cords, assistant athletic director here, said muddy conditions still persist in the dump site area despite the recent dry

the site has dried out, but the dirt beneath that is still very muddy," Cords said.
