## Commission works to boost equality for campus women

Few people realize it, but there is a university group devoted expressly to promoting equality for women on this campus - the Commission on the Status of

Created 10 years ago to advise University President Glenn Terrell on women's issues, the 23member commission represents faculty, staff, graduate and undergraduate students.

Chairwoman Aldora Lee, women studies assistant professor, described some of the commission activities in the past decade: "Our biggest impact has been developing the Women Studies program in 1977 and the Office of Programs for Women in 1978," she said. "We also helped the Affirmative Action office get started; they are trying to create administrative internships now for minorities and women."

The commission has also studied faculty pay equity to determine whether adjustments in women's salaries have actually taken place, Lee said. "It's easy to hire a woman at an equal pay level, but then not give her equal promotional pay incre-ments," she said.

One area the commission has spoken out on is Title IX and equality between men's and women's athletics. "We want to get scholarships for women athletes and equal space allocations for them," Lee said. However. the only action prompted by the commission so far has been ''progress-seeking' memos written by President Terrell.

Ex-officio commission member Celia Banks admitted progress with Title IX has not been im-

"We took a detailed look at women's athletics," Banks said, "by going over the space study, seeing how big lockerooms were and recommending space reallocations. But the results have not been too good."

Yesterday the commission elected seven new members: Sue Arledge and Darlene Townsend-Moller, faculty representatives; Hope Haugen, exempt representative; Sheryl Sodoroff and Diane Weber, staff representa-tives; Teresa Cook, graduate student representative; Debbie Asmund, undergraduate representative.



"Shakespeare Digest" will discuss the central plot of "The Tempest" tonight at 7:30 on KWSU-AM.




Tonight at 7 on KZUU "The Roots and Dixieland" will be presented on the history of lazz. Reed Gratz will co-host.
