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Executive administrative assistant was natural choice, Caires says

ASWSU senate unanimously voted in the executive staff administrative assistant to assume the position of vice president.

President Matt Caires nominated Heather McKnight, who appeared before senate members Wednesday night hoping to receive their vote of support of her bid for the position.

"It wasn't something I would have sought out, but I know I have the experience," McKnight said.

McKnight was a senator for two years and an administrative assistant last year and this year.

"It was just a natural position," Caires said. "I was looking for three things: Someone who would best represent WSU, someone who could jump right into the job, and someone who would balance me out."

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Community to determine PMH location

At first glance, Pullman Memorial Hospital's possible move off-campus appears focused on one aspect: The hospital.

A longer look at the possible move concentrates more on the concept of a medical community in Pullman.

"It would be difficult for the concept (of a medical community) to become a reality on campus," hospital administrator Scott Adams said. "It is more than just a hospital."

The PMH Board of Commissioners is discussing moving the hospital off campus and incorporating it with a medical community on 13 acres of hospital land off Bishop Boulevard. The board also is considering two other options: Keeping the hospital on campus as is or building a hospital adjacent to the current facility off Stadium Way.

Besides the hospital, a medical community would include physician office space, support services, a wellness center, laundry and food services, an assisted and independent living center, an inpatient hospice, a home health center, and a dental lab.

The Heritage House, through displays, literature and exhibits, chronicles the history of African Americans.
