1997-98 forms. A new feature offered this year is the option to apply for or renew the FAFSA on the World Wide Web after Jan. 2.

In order to use the renewal FAFSA on the Web, a few guidelines must be followed:

• The student must be living at the same address as was reported on the 1997-98 form.

• After going to the FAFSA Web site (www.fafsa.ed.gov), an Electronic Access Code must be requested. The access code will be sent to the address from the 1997-98 form.

• After receiving the code, go back to the FAFSA Web site after Jan. 2 and fill out the application form.

• Finally, a signature page must be submitted by mail.

For students completing the conventional paper form, the completed FAFSA form should be sent to the federal FAFSA office in the provided envelope, not to the Office of Student Financial Aid.

Chio Flores from the Office of Student Financial Aid said the number of financial aid recipients varies each year but is usually about 12,000.

Johanna Davis, assistant director of the Office of Scholarship Services, said it is hard to say how many students depend on scholarships.

"It seems like a simple question, but there are many kinds of scholarships," Davis said.

Since different departments on campus have different ways to handle their scholarships, students are advised to check with their departments about scholarships.

Financial aid checks for the spring 1998 semester will be available at the schedule/statement hand-out on Jan. 11.

After that day, checks for spring semester will be available at University Receivables, located at French Administration 340.

against ignorance," Huskey said.

These efforts are in response to recent incidents of hate speech on campus.

Steven Kale, a WSU history professor, received a flier Thursday that insulted his religion with a profanity and a swastika sign.

This came after he admitted he

is Jewish in a Daily Evergreen story about the controversial Holocaust revisionist home page.

A flier that had a swastika sign

with the word "ADIOS" written on it was posted at the Chicano/Latino Center.

An article with the headline "At least \$1 billion in benefits paid to ille-

gals in 1995" was printed on the flier.

Earlier this semester, the Women's Studies Program also received a flier that read "Stop the fags, lesbians and interracial mixing."

Various groups are planning more petitions, a rally and a forum to openly discuss hate speech and the campus and community climate.

20 students usually stay in dorms during the breaks. There is no charge for these accommodations.

During the break, all dining centers and campus stores are closed. As a result, some students have to get creative in order to keep from going hungry.

"A lot of people eat at the hospital," Bajczyk said.

Dorms close early for a few reasons, Bajczyk said. Hall staff need to do safety checks, which

includes making sure windows are closed, heat is turned down and electrical appliances are unplugged.

"We need to protect people from themselves," Bajczyk said jokingly.

Dorms also close early to allow the staff to have some time off.

"The staff needs a break just like everyone else, and custodians need to catch up on big projects," Bajczyk said.

Students moving out of the dorms permanently should have their rooms cleared out by Dec. 20.

"We could put (belongings) in storage, but

we'd prefer that it is out," Bajczyk said.

Instead, students are encouraged to move into their new place early or store things with friends.

Freshmen cannot move off campus until after their freshman year is complete. Bajczyk said studies have shown that freshmen living on campus their entire first year get better grades and are more involved with activities.

Unzicker said some staff will be back by Jan. 5 to help students move back in, while the rest of the staff will be back by the evening of Jan. 7.

Residence halls re-open Jan. 5 at 10 a.m. Spring semester starts Jan. 12.

Game-day activities begin with a 3 a.m. wake-up call for band members, who must be lined up and ready for the parade at 6 a.m. The exposure received from performing in the parade and halftime show at the game is one of the most important aspects of going to the Rose Bowl, Hower said.

The band will be compared to some of the finest marching bands in the country and is looking forward to it, he said.

"We get the opportunity to show what we can do," Hower said.

Not only are they guaranteed broadcast time during halftime, but the Cougars also will have the honor of playing the pregame

national anthem, which possibly will be televised as well, Graber said.

The Cougar halftime show will consist of a variety of several previously performed shows, Graber said. Most of it will be music from movies such as "Star Wars" and "Independence Day." He said band organizers thought movie music would be fitting for Southern California.

The band is rehearsing regularly to make sure its ready for New Year's Day. Some students are practicing walking long distances to prepare for the parade, which is one of the longest in the nation at more than five miles.

Graber stressed that once band members get to California and into game festivities, they will forget the long hours of practice and just enjoy themselves.

"There's a lot of things they haven't even imagined yet," he said.

The prestige of being involved with the Rose Bowl coupled with an opportunity to show off are the two things Novotney is looking forward to most.

"I think this is a privilege," she said. "We've worked hard all season, and we're really excited and proud ... to represent our school after 67 years."
