George not likely to sign with Seattle

ATLANTA (AP) — Jeff George won't become a Seahawk and probably won't be a Falcon for much longer, either.

The suspended quarterback remained with Atlanta on Tuesday as the NFL trading deadline passed without him agreeing on a new contract with Seattle. George and agent Leigh Steinberg had been talking with the Seahawks about a reported six-year, \$30

million contract. The Falcons were prepared to trade George straight up for Rick Mirer, Seattle's former starting quarterback.

However, George and the Seahawks couldn't agree before the 4 p.m. EDT deadline, apparently leaving the Falcons with no choice but to cut the seven-year veteran.

"We still have a couple of weeks to decide what to do with Jeff," coach June Jones said. "But our options are limited, obviously."

The coach did rule out George rejoining the Falcons.

"I don't think Jeff is interested in that and I don't think we could have him back," Jones said.

George was suspended by the Falcons after a sideline confrontation with Jones during a Sept. 22 loss to Philadelphia.

With Mirer struggling, the Seahawks showed interest, but no trade could be arranged.

"I just felt it was too rushed," George said of the negotiations, which intensified late last week. "I didn't think I would be in this situation, and I just wanted to make sure that the next (team) was the right one."

He insisted money wasn't a factor in his decision to sever negotiations with Seattle.

"So many numbers were being thrown around, I really didn't get into that," he said. "I just wanted to make sure that no matter where it was, it was the last place I went to. I said all along that this thing isn't about money. I wanted a clear mind."

The Falcons were downcast about the prospect of getting nothing in return for a quarterback who cost them two No. 1 draft picks in a 1994 trade with Indianapolis.

"Sure, I'm disappointed in it,"

the trigger.

George after he complained vehemently about being benched during the third quarter of the 33-18 loss to Philadelphia.

The suspension, initially for one game, was extended to four games after George met with the media to explain his side of the dispute.

Now, with two weeks remaining on the suspension, the Falcons' only option appears to be putting George on waivers, giving him total freedom to negotiate with a new team — and leaving the Falcons with nothing in return.

In Seattle, coach Dennis Erickson said of the failed negotiations, which left his team in a state of limbo the past week, "I'm a little disappointed on how it occurred."

But Erickson said he's looking forward to the Seahawks' next game, Oct. 17 at Kansas City, when John Friesz will start his second straight game and Mirer, the No. 2 overall pick in the 1993 draft, will be his backup.

"All I know is I'm going to get ready to kick butt with John," Erickson said. "I'm happy with that."

The Falcons couldn't trade George unless he agreed to a long-term contract. George, who signed a one-year, \$3.64 million contract with the Falcons in training camp, was hesitant to agree to a longer deal without testing the market as an unrestricted free agent.

"I wanted to be able to put my heart and soul into this decision, and I wasn't able to do that, because it happened so fast," George said. "Maybe now I can take a step back and make it right. I've made some mistakes in my career and I didn't want to make another one."

Several teams have said they won't pursue George, who gained the reputation as a selfish, immature
