Local group fights campus sexism, racism

The local president of the National Organization for Women said the group is not made up of a bunch of bra-burning feminists.

Most people tend to label groups like NOW as extremist, but president Debb Thorne said members are just normal, everyday people tired of discrimination.

On a national level, NOW is active in such issues as equal representation of women in politics, parental leave in the work place, gay and lesbian rights, child welfare and reproductive choice for women, Thorne said.

The Pullman chapter of NOW is involved in the "Take Back the Night March" - a demonstration of anger about the fact that women can't go out at night, Thorne said. They also take part in the "Roe vs. Wade" March, celebrating the anniversary of the decision to legal-

ize abortion. The main objective of the local NOW is to raise consciousness regarding sexism and racism, Thorne said, adding, "You can't have major political movements without awareness.'

To help raise awareness, NOW, in conjunction with the WSU Women's Studies Program, sponsored a showing of "Academic Harassment," a movie about sexual

harassment in higher education. The movie is an attempt to make people aware of sexual harassment in academia and to comfort those that have encountered harassment, Thorne said.

'Equity in education must begin with an environment in which women are safe from unwanted sexual advances. Many women do not yet have a name for what happens to them and we want them to be aware of the behaviors included in sexual harassment," Judy Meuth, a Women's Studies instructor at WSU, said.

Anyone can join NOW. Often men get involved after their wife, daughter or mother is a victim of discrimination.

Women have a more direct incentive for becoming a member of NOW since the current wage rate for women is 74 cents for every one dollar a man earns, Thorne said.

Sexism is destructive to men as well as women, Thorne said. "It stereotypes both.

Thorne's personal perspective of NOW's goal is "that differences are appreciated and respected and that everyone has a fair shot regardless of their class, race or sex.
