# Gay events, plans for next year noted

National Gay Bluejeans Day is

All gays will wear bluejeans on the day, which will be celebrated nationwide. However, all per-sons who wear bluejeans on April 14 are not necessarily gay, according to Gay Awareness of-

An active schedule is planned for next year by the Gay Awareness Committee, which is hoping to get funding for several new

Gay Awareness has requested \$5,000 in a preliminary proposal to the Youthgrant program under National Endowment for the Humanities. The program allows persons under 30 years of age to explore different subjects involving humanities. The group is awaiting approval of its request before submitting a formal proposal.

If the Youthgrant money is

obtained, it will be used for a gay conference next spring with the theme, "Stereotypes of Homosexuals."

The gays plan to work with either or both KWSU-TV and KWSU radio to present a program on the highlights of the conference.

Educating campus communities about the realities of homosexuality will be the purpose of the conference.

Gay Awareness has also

for next year. ASWSU did not allocate the group funding for the present (1977-78) school year. A hearing to consider the group's

request will be held April 6.

If Gay Awareness gets funding, the money will be used to publish a newsletter and to ex-

pand the group's library.

Expansion of the gay committee's library will be another goal next year, gay officials said. So far, the library has been built from money obtained mainly through personal donations. Half of the library consists of scientific and social studies on homosexuality, and the other half is gay fiction and poetry. The library is available to the public and is located in the Gay Awareness office.

The gays are also hoping to train several of their members to become peer counselors. The members must take a peer counseling class fall semester to become qualified peer counse-lors. Presently, the group offers informal counseling, referrals, and mutual support, but next spring it would like to set up a peer counseling center.

Another plan for next semes-ter is to establish a Free University class which will last the entire semester. It will present a general overview on homosexua-

lity.

The members of Gay Awareness have requested that they remain unnamed.
