

Student cuffed for throwing snowballs

A WSU freshman who was arrested when he admitted to throwing snowballs Wednesday night disagrees with investigating police officers; he says he was playing in the snow with friends and did not throw snowballs at a window or building.

The arresting police officer, Bryan E. Jacobson, said that Martin Weishaar was arrested for obstructing, hindering or delaying the investigation.

"He admitted to being there but he wouldn't tell me who he was with," Jacobson said. "That is delaying and hindering the investigation," he said.

According to Weishaar, officer Jacobson stopped at his desk in Holland Library and asked him if he was throwing snowballs

near Stevens Hall. When Weishaar answered yes, he said, Jacobson read him his rights and handcuffed him.

The arresting officers told a different story.

Jacobson and his partner said that a resident from Stevens Hall called because a group of men were throwing snowballs into their open window and hitting the wall inside the room.

Weishaar said he and his friends were confused at the time of the arrest because they did not know how police identified Weishaar as the person who threw the snowball at the window, which they allege never happened.

Officer Memmel said that she had taken several complaints, three days in a row, concerning individuals throwing snowballs at windows.

"The complaints were all at the same time, between 6 and 7 in the evening, near Stevens Hall" Memmel said.

Weishaar said he did not throw the snowballs at a window or building, but police officers Jacobson and Memmel disagree.

"I admitted to throwing the snowballs at my friends," he said. "I never hit a building."


The window that they were throwing snowballs in is at least 15 feet off the ground, Jacobson said. "It is hard to believe they weren't trying to throw them in the window," he said.

According to Memmel, the people involved with the incident talked with the hall director to deal with the situation before it was out-of-hand.

They agreed to shovel snow off the sidewalks outside the hall," Memmel said.

Both candidates are scheduled to meet with several administrators, students, and organizations, including GLBA program staff, Interim Provost Geoff Gamble, and graduate and undergraduate student groups.

There will be a presentation and open questions session with the campus-wide GLBA Program Advisory Board and Human Relations and Resource unit staffs on Wednesday from 1:30 to 3 p.m., and on Thursday from 2 to

3:30 p.m. in CUB B1-5.

The chosen candidate will be a member of the Human Relations and Resource Division reporting directly to the vice provost for the division.

"The director will be responsible for the overall administration, direction, execution, and evaluation of the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Allies Program and Center," according to the position summary.

Basically, the director will oversee the program and the center, said Cindy Gallagher, the search committee chair and WSU Diversity Education Program director.

She said the director's job is broader than just dealing with the student group. He or she will oversee the GLBA Center but will also

Utah State University, will meet with university officials, faculty, staff, students and the general community Friday.


President Sam Smith has indicated he would like to offer the provost position before Christmas. Bataille could become the university's first female provost.
