fraternity, Rogers said.

He said although Cloud wasn't an uptight person and he never saw him lose his temper, "he always wanted to have a good time when he drank — it didn't matter what the consequences were," he added, reflecting on Cloud's dismissal from the fraternity.

Dan Thumlert, a former pledge brother of Cloud, said: "Darrell had a wild temper. But this is something I never would have imagined he was capable of — unless he was provoked."

Cloud, who was an outstanding quarterback at Juanita High School, led his teammates to a state championship in 1986. The following year, he came to WSU as a walk-on and played one year for the Coupars.

Rogers, a friend of the Cloud family, said Cloud left WSU because of academic deficiency. Afterward, he went to Green River Community College, where he set the single-season home run record for the college.

"He was an athlete," Rogers said. "He also played baseball for two years at the UW."

Although the case will be pending for months, the people who know Cloud say they will be waiting for answers.

"I keep expecting to turn on the TV and see a big story on 'A Current Affair,' "Thumlert said. "It's unfair what the press will do to the Cloud family in the upcoming months."



He also said the GLBA is not ready to take any more serious action. The new group is still going through an adjustment process which includes learning to be vocal.


