Poet Alex Kuo read some of his work during "Resistance is Futile" in the Fine Arts Building Monday night. The production opened the art department's series on art for disarmament.


State of Union address tonight

WASHINGTON (AP) — The three major commercial television networks, along with the Cable News Network and PBS, will broadcast President Reagan's State of the Union address tonight.

The speech is scheduled to begin at 9 p.m. EST and will be carried live by ABC, CBS and NBC, as well as CNN and the Public Broadcasting Service.

Democrats will follow Reagan's speech with a 30-minute taped program featuring dozens of officials and "ordinary citizens" rather than a more traditional discussion of issues among party leaders, a Democratic official said Tuesday.

However, ABC has decided to delay broadcast of the Democrats' tele-



vised response until 10:30 p.m. Thursday.

ABC officials said Tuesday the network will broadcast its normal Wednesday night lineup, including its top-rated series, "Dynasty." The officials refused to discuss the reason for the delay.

The president's address this year falls within the important month-long "sweeps" period when ratings for local TV stations help determine future advertising rates.

Marlene Howell, faculty advisor for GPA, followed Beam with a clarification of what the GPA bill was about.

"I would like to keep clear that the (GPA's) function is to educate. We want to inform the students of a human orientation of lifestyle, not to promote a certain lifestyle. I've never said to come out and try gay or lesbian sex," Howell said.

She pointed out to the programming committee that the issue at hand was whether or not the GPA met the criteria to become an ASWSU com-

dized advertising."

"They don't want to put up the money themselves because they know they don't deserve it," Hardgin said.

Several psychology and sociology instructors told the committee that having members of the GPA talk to their classes was very important.

Gloria Fisher, an instructor of human sexuality said that it was an "important" and "unique" experience to have members of the group come and speak to her class.

Frank Chase, a former homosexual said that homosexuality was a matter of choice and all persons are heterosexual no matter what they practice.

"I am a male...you can tell that by looking at me," Chase said.

Keith Russel, a student here, said that he had passed a petition against the granting of committee status to GPA.

Russel's main thrust was that homosexuality was wrong and that the GPA wanted funds to promote its lifestyle.
