

Guy M. Brislawn 1902 - 1981

CITY—A former budget officer and chief accountant for the university died Friday at age 79.

Guy M. Brislawn started the purchasing office of the university, was a charter member of Pi Kappa Alpha, former president of the Pullman Kiwanas Club and chairman and board member of the Pullman Community Chest. He was also active in the Association of Purchasing Agents and the National Association of Education Buyers.

Brislawn, a resident of an Olympia-area

retirement community, was a native of Sprague, Wa. He graduated from the university and became its purchasing director in 1944 after serving 14 years with the Vermont Loan and Trust Company of Spokane.

He is survived by his wife, Mildred; a son, Matthew of Mercer Island; and a daughter, Mrs. Lynn Rosenstock of San Francisco.

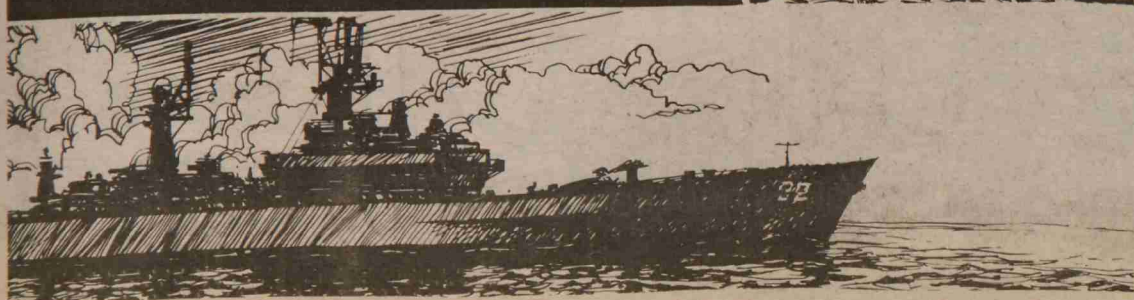
