Gajdzik, a freshman, also found opening-round success with a 1-6, 6-2, 6-0 win over Northwestern's Katherine Nasser. Her success, though, was short-lived, as she fell to Lenka Jakubekova of South Alabama, 6-1, 0-6, 6-2.

4-6, 6-4, 6-2 score. They also lost in a consolation match to Karen Goldstein and Vanessa Webb of Duke 6-0 6-2

The WSU doubles duo of Reisz and Gajdzik started off their tournament with a bang. They defeated Purdue's Jennifer Embry and Mary Beth Maggart, 6-2, 6-7, 7-5. Purdue was the No. 2 seed in the qualifying tournament.

Reisz and Gajdzik made it through the qualifying round with a 6-2, 6-3 win over a North Carolina State opponent.

In the main draw, Reisz and Gajdik were ousted in their opener, losing 7-5, 6-3 to Mississippi's Irena Milhailova and Mariana Eberle.

Next up for the Cougars will be the BYU Invitational, scheduled for next Thursday and Friday. In addition to WSU, Boise Stare and Utah will compete.




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
