Local residents have the opportunity to see how the Palouse advanced the late 19th and early 20th centuries through "Whitman County at Work," at the Holland Library atrium.

A free photo exhibit was created by the Community Action Center of Pullman and will be in the library until Sunday.

Including historic photographs from 1890-1925, the photos show the people of early Whitman County who helped turn the Palouse into what it is today.


"In the last two years, there has been a creative movement toward maintaining tradi-


tional events and adding non-competitive events," said Dan Maher, Homecoming committee adviser. . "These will help establish a unified campus feeling."
