Fair housing code debate to highlight council meeting

CITY—Discussion may get heated tonight when the City Council concludes its several-week debate over an amendment to the municipal fair housing code.

One feature of the amendment is to prohibit housing discrimination on the basis of sexual preference or orientation.

The affect of the amendment would be to put the city out of the business of enforcing its fair housing code.

The Pullman Fair Housing Commission will continue to exist as a mediator between tenants

and landlords, but enforcement in discrimination cases will be turned over to the state Human Rights Commission.

Proponents argue civil rights should not have to be debated. Most of them, associated with the organized gay groups, argue persons either perceived as being homosexual or who are gay, need the law's protection.

Opponents, generally affiliated with one of the community's fundamentalist churches, argue the city would be approving of the 'sin of sodomy."

Pullman man electrocuted, anotherinjured

CITY—The son of two university employees was killed and another man suffered first, second and third degree burns Sunday while attempting to erect a television antenna.

Karl W. Bienz, 24, died Sunday night of electrocution at his residence north of Pullman. Bienz is the son of horticulture professor Darrell R. Bienz and architecture Librarian Technician III Betty J. Bienz.

The accident apparently occurred when Bienz and Raemon Lee Bohn, 25, also of Pullman, were attempting to install the antenna. Both men were standing on a metal roof holding the antenna when it came into contact with high voltage wires.

The incident is still under investigation by the Whitman County Sheriff's Office.

Bohn was admitted to the Memorial Hospital where he was listed in stable condition late Monday afternoon.

Funeral services for Bienz are being conducted by Kimball Funeral Home.


