Huskies hosted for home finale

WSU's Cougars will play their last home game of the 1969 season over the weekend, when cross-state rivals from the University of Washington visit to close out the league schedules for both schools.

Seniors who will take the field for the last time include captain Steve Dickerson, Norm Angelini, Larry Book and Jim Robinson.

Coach Chuck Brayton will probably go with Mickey Babler in the first game at 3 p.m. today, and plans on starting either Jeff Clark or Mike Gomez on the mound at 2 p.m. tomorrow.

The Cougars will end their season with a Shrine benefit game in Lewiston against Idaho, while Washington will end with city rivals Seattle-Pacific and Seattle University.

Cougar ace Norm Angelini will be held back in a reserve role. "Norm's been pitching hard commented Brayton. "Gomez should be okay. He's got some good breaking stuff and throws hard. Bob Williams catcher, will suit up, but he's going to have a knee operation next week and we'll only be using him in reserve or for pinch hitting. John Sullivan will do most of the catching, and he's a good one."

Coach Ken Lehman of the Huskies has a similar problem, but no corresponding answer. His regular catcher, Loren Brucker, was sidelined with an ankle sprain and a couple of outfielders wound up behind the plate against UCLA. "We had about 11 passed balls in that doubleheader, which must be some kind of a record," sighed Lehman. "We had people volunteer, but that's not a position where you can just stick somebody. Loren will make the trip, but his ankle is still bad. And his replacement split a finger. I guess when things go bad they seem to get worse.'

And worse it could get, if Bobby Waits, with 17 steals, Manny Perez with 11 and John Rankin (10) decide to challenge

the backstopper.

The Huskies will start Gary Huson and Jim Pope on the mound in a bid for their second league win in 19 attempts, and their seventh victory overall. "We're hungry. Our appetites are whet,' Lehman admitted, "We hit the ball well against WSU our last game, but we didn't score."

If WSU takes both games, it

will shut the Huskies out of victories in football, basketball, track and baseball. In two years, Washington has taken one baseball win in those four sports. The Cougars hold a current 24-15 mark for the season, and are assured of a second division finish. The Huskies have a deathgrip on last place, and haven't taken a series from the Cougars since 1957.

Another defensive star on tap for the game is All-AFL safety Ken Graham of the San Diego Chargers. It was Graham who tipped the pass in last year's game that Freddie Moore caught in the waning seconds of the contest to give the Varsity a 7-6

Dave Middendorf, rookie lineman for the Cincinnati Bengals, is also scheduled to make an appearance. Middendorf is regarded by many as the finest Cougar lineman in recent years.

Possibly the most famous Cougar of recent time is Keith Lincoln. Lincoln is an assistant coach of the Alum team but he too is slated to see some action. Lincoln, like Graham, plays for the San Diego Chargers, In 1965 Lincoln was voted the MVP in the then recently-formed AFL.

Making the trek down from Canada for the contest is Ted Gerela. He was the outstanding field goal kicker in the Canadian League last year. He may also see playing time at fullback.

Coaches for the Alums are Frank Mataya and Byron Bailey. Both were Cougar stars mearly three decades ago.
