Hate speech fliers prompt anti-fliers

As the hate speech on campus increases so are the responses.

Several groups — students, community members, faculty, staff and churches — are taking an active role in standing up against hate speech.

The groups are circulating petitions around campus. One such petition asks people to sign their name denouncing hate speech.

The petitions states:

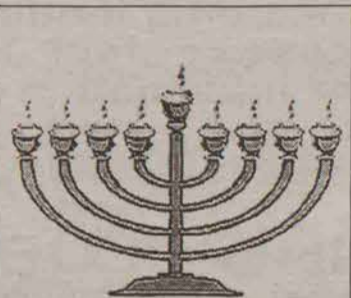
"We will not tolerate hate here — our voice is strong, loud and clear. This is a good place. We are proud of where we live. Let our voices join together to say clearly — hate is not welcome here."

A collection of concerned people also are posting fliers on campus that have a picture of a menorah with the word "Bienvenidos!" The idea started with an e-mail discussion and was turned into action at a meeting in the Women's Studies Program office Monday.

The menorah symbolizes a stance against anti-Semitic messages and the "Bienvenidos" (meaning welcome in Spanish) was an answer to a flier posted at the Chicano and Latino Center on Thursday.

The fliers are meant to send a message of no tolerance for any kind of hate speech, said Marian Sciachitano, an instructor in the Women's Studies Program.

Other reasons for the fliers are to raise the awareness of the people who may not have been following the story and to continue the dialogue about the situation, she said.

The organizers ask people to post the flier and take a stand against hate speech.

The fliers are available at the Women's Studies Center in Wilson Hall, at the Diversity Education Program office on the first floor of the French Administration building and at the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Allies center in CUB B19.

The GLBA also created a bulletin board outside the center to address the Holocaust, said Melynda Huskey, the program's director.

The center also created a folder with a bibliography of works that deal with the prosecution of gay men in the Holocaust. Huskey said the center is trying to also raise awareness.

Be aware of dorm closures

Students living in residence halls must be out before the halls close at 10 a.m. Dec. 20.

For students who need to stay in a dorm during winter break, the following dorms will be open: Gannon-Goldsworthy, McCroskey, McEachern, Orton, Rogers, Scott-Coman and Streit-Perham.

Residence Hall Association adviser Jim Bajczyk said the official rule is students must be out 24 hours after their last final.

"That rule is really only enforced if people are being too loud," he said.

Housing Services does find empty rooms for students in the open dorms during break if they live in another dorm, said Housing Services Director Jerry Marczynski. Making reservations beforehand is necessary.

"You have to go to the Residence Life office by Dec. 19 at noon," Marczynski said.

The Residence Life office is located at 151 Streit-Perham in the McCarten Administrative Suites.

Marczynski also said contracts signed by students at the beginning of the year included details about housing during breaks.

RHA Director Tom Unzicker said between 10 and

As January approaches, the annual financial aid hunt begins once again.

Students applying for Free Application for Federal Student Aid for the first time or for renewal can pick up any necessary forms in the Office of Student Financial Aid, located in Lighty 380.

Students looking for scholarships for the 1998-99 school year can obtain applications at the Office of Scholarship Services, also located in Lighty 380.

The priority deadline for scholarship applications is Feb. 1.

The priority deadline for FAFSA applications is March 1.

Students who completed a 1997-98 FAFSA form should be mailed a renewal FAFSA form for 1998-99 in

mid-January. Students in this category who don't receive their renewal forms by Jan. 31 have to get a FAFSA form at the Office of Student Financial Aid.

Students who do not turn in FAFSA forms by March 1 will be awarded financial aid based on funds still available.

FAFSA forms for 1998-99 are blue, as opposed to green for the
