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Bosnia: Soldiers arrest civilians for anything, director of RES-Q says

In 1994, RES-Q's director Stephen Long felt like he was drifting. Long had to retire from the Snohomish County Fire Department after a back injury and was unhappy living in Seattle.

He complained to his sister, who suggested he visit someplace worse. "Go to Bosnia, they're having a war over there,' she told me," he said.

Long went to Bosnia and volunteered with nonprofit groups. On a break, he went to visit a local police station and was shocked by the lack

They were fighting fires in jeans and T-shirts," he said. "I thought if I could go back to my old department and ask for their old,

outdated equipment, I could really help them."

In Seattle, Long expected to receive a few pieces of equipment. He ended up getting over \$60,000 worth of fire gear from local fire departments. He started

RES-Q to obtain status as a nonprofit group and specifically works with firefighters.

"The goal is to give fire departments a chance to do their jobs again," Long said. "We try to interfere with the community as little as possible, I'd rather the fire departments get the attention."

RES-Q's main contacts are the fire departments because they know who needs help and how to steer the group away from trouble.

"There's a lot of mafia in the government," Long said. "Things we take for granted over here can instantly be taken away. You can be arrested for no other reason than they want the supplies off your vehicle."

Long found that out when he tried to bring diapers through a military checkpoint. He believes the two

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young officers who arrested him probably wanted the diapers for their families.

Long managed to get other supplies through the checkpoints by dressing up as a Roman Catholic priest and stuffing diapers in his

"They flagged us right through. You don't mess with a priest," Long said.

While driving to Jablanica, in central Bosnia, men with guns came out of bushes along the road and surrounded

Long's car. They did not wear uniforms and Long thought they could be guerrillas. The men forced Long and the other volunteers out of their car and took what supplies they were

"I didn't know if we were going to get killed," Long said. "It's mellowed out a lot. Now I would say you're more likely to die from a land mine or a drunk soldier."

Many Americans don't understand that people are trapped in Bosnia and Serbia, Long said. He does not believe American soldiers will leave the area anytime soon.

"They're like a security blanket for the country," Long said. "Life there is not easy like it is for us. They can't just get on a bus or a car and
