

Gay rights fund request before student assembly

Members also work in the Women's Center and the committee has maintained a library "open to all students" in its office, 492-A CUB.

The committee needs money for the telephone because many people who contact GAC about homosexuality are afraid to just drop in, the committee chairwoman said.

"People are just not that way. They won't stop by and say to a stranger, 'Hi, I'm gay.'" she said.

Telephone costs for the committee are \$12 a month for local calls, \$16 for installation and \$20 for long distance charges for the year.

The GAC is not just a committee for gays, the chairwoman said. "We want to get more students involved, both straight and gay. We're here for everyone."

Caruthers added, "The committee is available if parents discover that their child is gay, or if a roommate discovers their roommate is gay, or if a sibling discovers their brother or sister is gay or even if somebody discovers that their boyfriend or girlfriend is gay...the committee is there to help."

Student Bill Marler said the discussion was on two separate ideas. One idea was "I don't like gays" and the other was whether ASWSU "should fund an educational group."

He said, "There are ideas we don't like that we have to be educated on."

John Meglan, also a student, said there is a misconception on the West Coast about gays. "This

happens a lot in Pullman. People have a tendency to stick their head in the sand and ignore problems."

He added that while funding may set a precedent, maybe other groups that are oppressed might come forward and ASWSU could help them.

A second student voiced his objection that funding would promote homosexuality.

His comments were met by those of student who said, "That's not what they're trying to do at all. Just because they are given money doesn't mean they are going to hit everybody over the head saying 'this is right.'"

She classified the money to be spent as an educational tool.

Wildlife film festival this week

The ASWSU Environmental Task Force will present a free "Wildlife Film Festival" Nov. 1 and 2, according to Kim Novotny, committee chairman.

The festival, designed to expose students to environmental concerns, features six films and will include discussion sessions.

The discussions will center around the films, and, in particular, around the Alaska Lands bill, a current concern of the organization. The bill, scheduled to be taken up by Congress again next year, may determine the status of large segments of land in Alaska.

The festival begins Wednesday evening at 7 in the CUB Auditorium with "Manimals," an award-winning film which takes an unusual look at exotic pets and their owners. "Vanishing Land," a documentary which examines the effect of advancing civilization on the Alaskan wilderness, Alaskan wildlife, and

the Eskimo culture, follows at 7:30.

The scene switches to the Heald Auditorium for the Thursday night presentations. "Following the Tundra Wolf," an award-winning documentary on the lifestyle of the tundra wolf, opens the evening at 7. Dr. Seuss' animated feature "The Lorax" follows at 8.

Scheduled to begin at 8:30 is "Admiralty Island, Fortress of the Bears," a Sierra Club film detailing the unique environment of Alaska's panhandle. This is one area, in particular, to be considered in the Alaska Lands bill. An artist's view of environmental issues is detailed in "The Quiddity Tree," scheduled to start at 9 pm and wrap up the festival.

ETF will get involved in issues throughout the year as they arise, said Novotny. In addition, the group plans to again present the "Marine Mammals Symposium" in April.
