SIRC will also have a table at the CUB where they will pass out HIV and AIDS information and will play movies, such as "Philadelphia" and "And the Band Played On" throughout the day.

In preparation for the nighttime ceremony, they will also be passing out luminaries for students to take home or bring back that night. The

lighting event will consist of a fifteen-minute period of silence to commemorate the 1986 San Francisco march that brought public attention to the HIV and AIDS epidemic.

In addition to the CUB, luminaries will also be distributed in the UI campus, at the Whitman County Health Departments in Pullman and Colfax and at Dissmore's.

and biological science all responded with interest. "Many other campus dorms have been doing academic themes for a while," Jorgensen said. "This will allow for students to find study partners right across the hall."

And students are taking advantage of the program.

"We all get along really well," said Nicole Winn, a resident adviser for a pre-nursing floor in Goldsworthy Hall.

She said there have been no big problems, but a few of the parents were not informed their sons and daughters were living on mixed-sex floors, so it was a bit of a shock to them when they came to visit, Winn said.

"Bathrooms are not a problem," she said. "The girls have their bathroom at one end of the hall, and the guys at the other end."

Linda Lyon, the residence hall director for Gannon Hall, said, "I personally haven't heard feedback from either position, but from what I can tell, things are going well with the co-ed academic theme floors."

Next year, the Stephenson complex can expect to see some changes similar to Gannon and Goldsworthy halls.

"We want to set up residential learning communities within Stephenson for business and communications majors," Jorgensen said.

The residential learning communities would be one or more floors of students with the same major and classes.

important tool of any would-be craft maker.

Glue is very sensitive to moisture, Meyers said. "You might have things falling off because of the weather," she said.

"I try to use environmental things," Meyers said. Pine cones are an easy, inexpensive item people can use to make many types of decorations, she said.

One simple decorating idea Meyers suggests people try is a basket decorated with gold and silver-painted pine cones trimmed with a string of lights.

"If you really filled this basket up with pine cones, it would be quite heavy," she said. Instead, Meyers suggest gluing crumpled newspaper into the bottom of the basket for filler. The basket is finished with a string of miniature bulbs, which she said do not get hot enough to pose a fire hazard.

Meyers uses the basket as a receptacle for rejected pine cones- the better ones get made into centerpieces, pincushions, or little snowmen.

"You could always buy (pine cones)," she said, "but what does that do to your shoe-string?"
