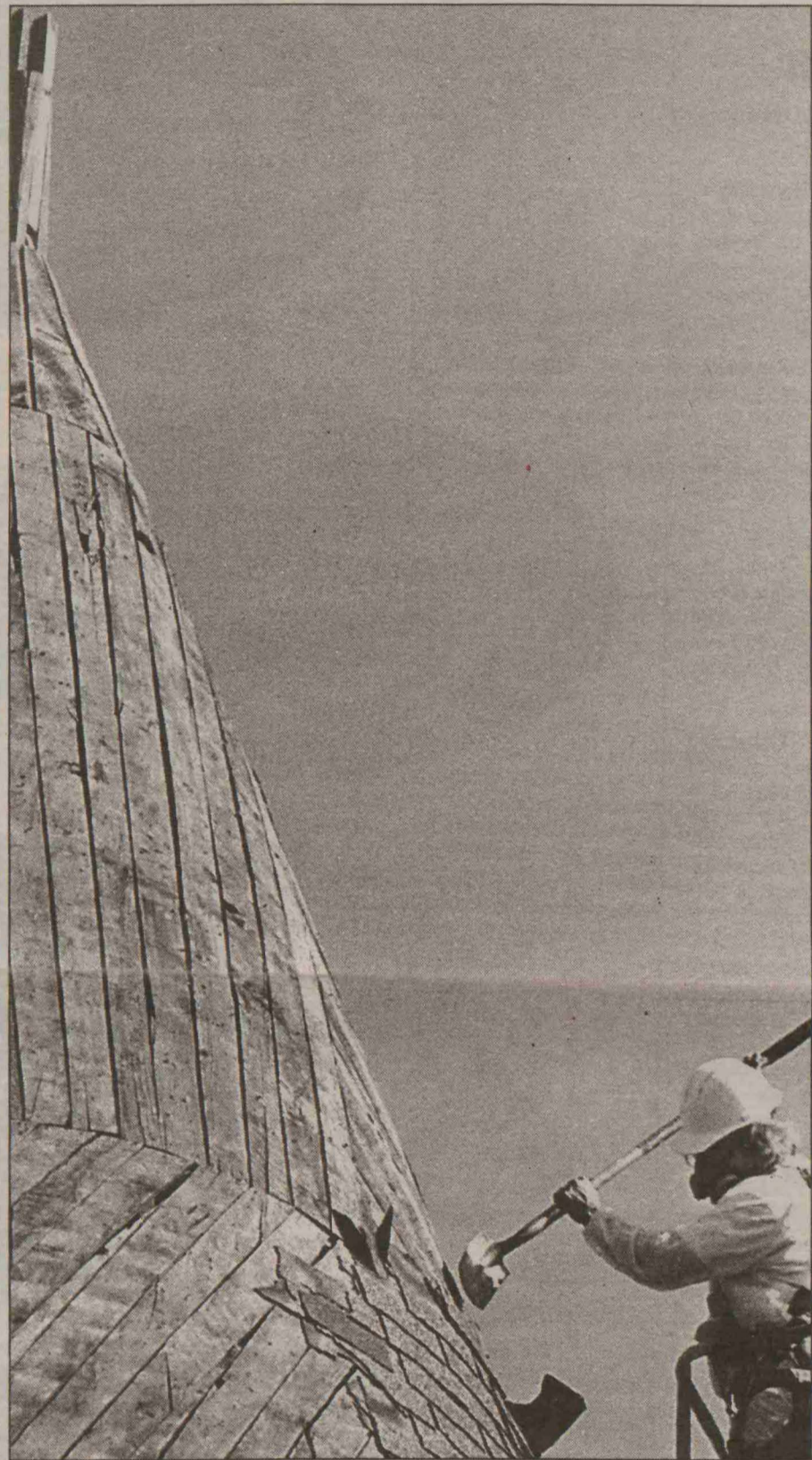

## Evacuees begin their return after Georges exits

EPASCAGOULA, Miss. — The whirlwind that was Georges began to disappear from the weather map Tuesday, but its story was still being written: Rains drenched Alabama and the Florida Panhandle, and evacuees slowly returned to find out what happened to their homes.

"I had waterfront property, waterback property, waterside property, watereverywhere property," said 43-year-old postal worker Jayne Howell, who found her brick ranch house in Pascagoula awash in sewage, seaweed and branches.

Downgraded to just a tropical depression, Georges and its downpours moved

northeast, into Georgia and South Carolina. A flash flood watch was issued for south and central Georgia and parts of South Carolina through Wednesday morning. The hurricane wind that ripped through the coast with gusts as high as 174 mph had dropped to 35 mph.

President Clinton declared the entire storm-damaged swath a disaster area and planned to visit as soon as recovery operations allowed. Power remained out to about 400,000 customers from Louisiana to Florida.

Rivers continued to overflow: The Pascagoula River at Merrill rose from 3.4 feet on Monday to 20.8 feet on Tuesday and was expected to swell to more than 26.5 feet later in the day, nearly 5 feet over flood stage.

## City Attorney urges drinking ordinance

City Council hears plans for a new drinking ordinance.

The Pullman City Council heard plans for a new ordinance that will give city police power over public parties.

In the Tuesday night session, city attorney Thomas Kingen discussed a new public drinking ordinance, intended to compliment existing city noise ordinances in cracking down on unruly public partying.

"This ordinance is designed to deal with the dispensing, using, and drinking of alcohol in public," Kingen said. The ordinance will give Pullman Police the ability to cite unruly drinkers, rather than just underage drinkers, in public and private areas.

"This is not an attempt to regulate people who drink responsibly in a public place," Kingen added. Under the new ordinance, officers cannot simply enter private residences at will. As in the city noise ordinance, there must be public complaints before officers can enter homes, though Kingen said that noise and parties go hand in hand most of the time.

"This ordinance is intended to tie the issue of noise to drinking," Kingen said.

Some of the councilors questioned the need for the public drinking ordinance.

"This one makes me a little nervous," said council member Tom Sanders. "I'm all for responsible behavior, but when you talk about legislating legal drinking on private property, it makes me nervous."

## GLBA kicking off Gay and Lesbian month

This month, the Gay Lesbian Bisexual Allies Program is organizing events for the 10th anniversary of Gay and Lesbian History Month, says Melynda Huskey, director of the GLBA Program.

"Gay and lesbian people have contributed greatly to the history of this country; this is their chance to get noticed," Huskey said.

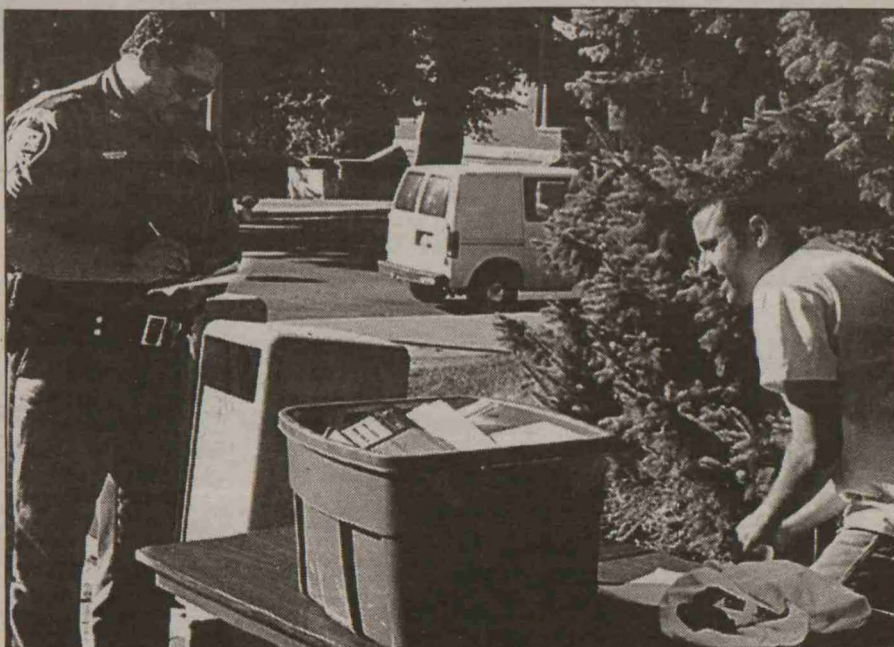
A schedule of events for Gay and Lesbian History month is as follows:
