

# Summer funding awarded

## Organizations receive funding from Student and Activities Fees Committee

After hearing proposals from five campus organizations, the Service and Activities Fees Committee made a tentative decision Thursday night for the Summer Session fee allocation.

The committee allocated \$127,925 as follows:

- Student Health — \$69,825
- Summer Recreation — \$25,375
- CUB — \$22,750
- Child Care — \$6,475
- Student Publications — \$3,500

Mary Ellen Ellsworth, director of WSU Child Care Center, described her program as quality child care for two- to ten-year-old children of WSU students.

The center stresses children's social, emotional, physical, and intellectual development. The center is funded through user fees, S & A fees, and the USDA child care food program.

Student Health traditionally has received the most funding of the summer groups. Betty Adams, director, said Student Health receives no state funding and must rely on student financial support.

"We'll be able to have our health service open for open this summer," Adams said. "There is a limited amount of S & A fees and many worthwhile causes."

The CUB remains open during the summer months to benefit summer students, faculty, staff, and visitors. However, the CUB cannot generate self-supporting revenue during those months.

Matt Carey, CUB director, said additional funding is necessary to make up for custodial, maintenance, new projects costs and equipment replacement.

Summer recreation provides a wide variety of physical, cul

- \* A safety oriented program which provides rides to women students who otherwise have to walk alone at night.
- \* For the purpose of providing equal access for women students to WSU's academic resources and programs, such as libraries, night classes, meetings, and university sponsored programs.
- \* Overloaded many nights, causing delays and frustrations for riders, volunteers and staff; Therefore, please use it responsibly.

## What Women's Transit Is Not:

- \* A free ride for your convenience because you don't want to walk in the rain or for some other reason.
- \* To take you and your friend to a party.
- \* To take you to get groceries.
- \* To take you to a friend's house.
- \* A taxi service.

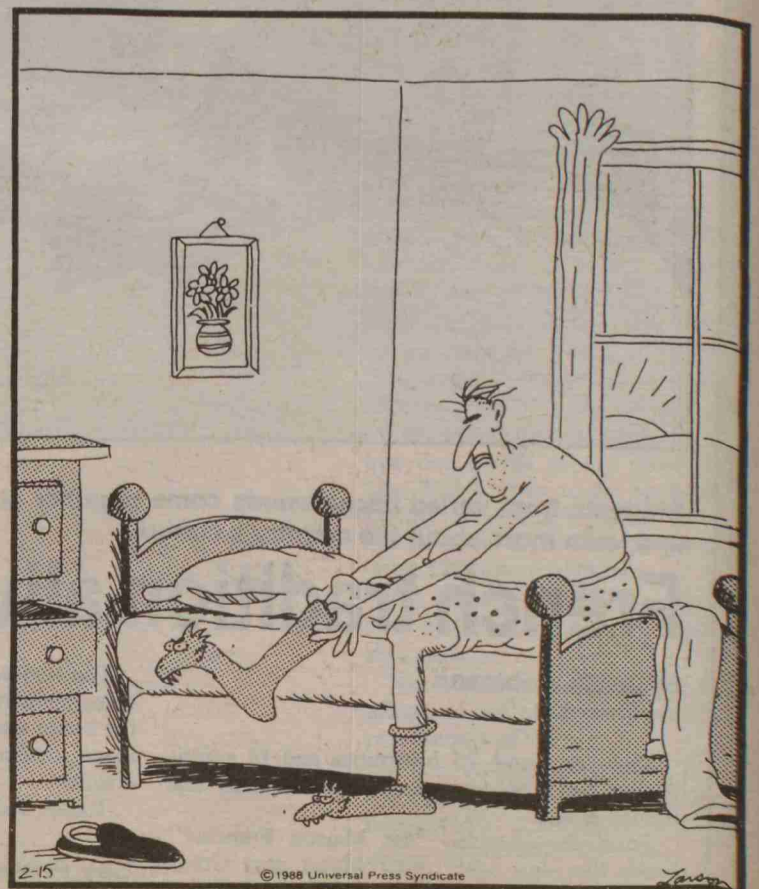
## How To Use It Responsibly:
