I went to the vice presidential candidate debate on Friday with hopes to learn where each stood on issues that concern the students of WSU. Being a woman and ethnic minority, I knew diversity would be a major issue for all of the tickets.

Coming away from the debate I felt that Karen Carlson, a woman and an ethnic minority herself, who has studied abroad and was involved in APASC (Asian/Pacific American Student Center), would have the best insight to WSU's struggle with diversity.

But upon reading the article written by Jeff Nusser on Fri., March 1, I felt that it was biased in John Robinson's favor, and the article itself was not journalism at its best. I do not think that the article correctly depicted what happened at the debate.

First of all, in the article, there were over 10 references to Robinson, while there were only five for Karen Carlson and four for Lora Kriedler. That showed me that Nusser did not write the article objectively.

The question asked to all the candidates if they were involved in any diversity groups. Nusser was correct in saying that none of them were presently involved in any diversity groups, but each had experience in that area. Moreover, some candidates have more experience on the topic of diversity than the others.

He referred to Robinson as a strong advocate for diversity, and that terribly disturbed me! Granted he was a co-sponsor for the

GLBA's bill, but talking with friends in the multicultural circuit, many had not even heard of or seen John Robinson or Aleana Wixson for that matter until a few weeks before they decided to run as a presidential ticket.

Diversity also means different ethnic groups. It is these other "groups of diversity" that make up about 11 percent of WSU's population. Robinson using the word "diversity" as his political crutch offends me a great deal. If he is an advocate for diversity, why isn't he in any multicultural groups?

He also referred to minorities who have entered institutions of higher education, such as WSU, as "people like 'that'" who have taken advantage of the system. Advocated for diversity - I think not!


Nusser's portrayal of Robinson in
