Tainted meat causes deaths

VANCOUVER, British Columbia (AP) — Three elderly women patients at Edith Cavell private hospital in Vancouver died because they ate tainted ground beef in their hospital diet, Vancouver coroner Larry Campbell ruled.

In issuing his findings Monday, he classified the deaths as homicide — a legal term that does not imply blame.

The coroner made 14 recommendations to Edith Cavell dealing

with the obtaining and handling of food and the cleanliness of staff and the utensils used. He said the hospital has complied with all the recommendations.

The three women who died were among 13 of the 60 patients at the hospital who became ill with what appeared to be a form of diarrhea last August. Florence Mallicoat, 89, died in Shaughnessy Hospital Aug. 25. Eva Amelia Lackey, 79, died in Van-

couver General Hospital Sept. 12, and Helen Jessie Gordon died in St. Vincent's Hospital Sept. 16.

Only Mallicoat's death was reported to the coroner's service when it occurred and Campbell ordered a full inquiry when he discovered the other deaths in October.

In his report, he accepted the explanation that the deaths were not reported because they were not sudden and the patients were elderly.

GURs that lost status can be repeated

Students who repeat courses that lost GUR status will receive GUR credit for them anyway.

That's what the Academic Affairs Committee of the Faculty Senate approved during at its meeting yesterday afternoon.

"For students who took the GUR in 1984, and repeat it in 1985, does it count as a GUR or not?" asked Registrar C. James Quann.

"It comes down to the initial commitment to the student. It should still be a GUR," he said.

The AAC decided that students should be allowed to repeat the course once.

"They should get one extra crack at it," said Barry Farmer, professor of materials science and engineering.

The decision does not have to go before the Faculty Senate since it was only a "clarification of policy," said Quann.

The AAC also established a procedure, contingent upon approval of the Faculty Senate, to allow students

who study overseas in non-western areas to fulfill their new intercultural GURs.

The Office of International Programs suggested that student participation in a non-western, university-approved program should fulfill the Intercultural GUR requirement. The AAC approved this proposal, requiring "successful completion" of the program.

The committee also approved a procedure for determining which overseas programs would fulfill the Intercultural GUR requirement. "The Office of International Programs will submit a list of (non-western) programs for review and approval of the AAC," said committee chairman Geoffrey Gamble, professor of anthropology.

Gamble said approval would rest with the AAC, but that the committee would ask the Faculty Senate that it be allowed to make the decision.

University programs in India, Kenya, China, Sri Lanka, and Japan were submitted as being non-western.

that they had made it clear that status would lead to funding.

"Someone indicated that it would cost a nickel per student to fund (the GPA) but, it better not be my nickel," Dish said.

Steven Bay (Dist. 5), said he was a tool of his constituents.

"I will vote nay to this bill. My constituents are against the funding of the GPA and this bill does include funding. Free office space is money," Bay said.

Rob Bartlett (chair pro tem), read an excerpt from the senate constitution outlining the duties of the senators.

We are to "represent student interest..." and "supplement and compliment formal education," he said.

He added that the senators should not be coerced by threats of recall.

"We should represent the students in the long run and in the short run," Bartlett said.

An undergraduate student who wished to remain anonymous was recognized by the senate to make a statement in favor of the bill.

"I'm not going to give my name because I don't want to. There's too much hostility out there," the student said.

He indicated that his brother was a homosexual and it had been very difficult for him to tell his parents.

"That's why we need to have a gay awareness group on campus," he said.

The student urged the senate members to pass the bill even though they may feel it wrong now.

"For 100 years the majority of the people (in the U.S.) thought slavery was okay," he said.

Guerra said in his final statement, "I have only one reason why to vote yes...because it's right."

MacMath said after the meeting that he would be stepping into the political arena.

"Due to the outcome of the meeting, the (GPA) has decided to support me as a candidate for a position as an ASWSU, at large senator," he said.

MacMath indicated that he would be running on a platform of "rights for all students."

I pledge never to have sexual relations with a woman against her will or without her consent. If we do enter into mutually consenting sexual relationship, I pledge to take responsibility for the use of birth control through the use of condoms or by having a vasectomy, unless my partner and I have discussed birth control and decided as a couple to use female, rather than male birth control. I will take the initiative in this because women historically have been expected to manipulate or alter their bodies in order to control fertility, and I believe that it is only fair that men become more directly involved in this matter.

If we, by consent, agree not to use birth control, or if our birth control fails and a pregnancy results, I pledge to do the following:

- 1) be prepared to interrupt my career, my schooling, my other plans in order to care for the child I have fathered for a period of time not less than eighteen years. This care will include child support payments of one half the needed amount or more, depending on my partner's ability to pay, since women still earn only two-thirds of what men earn; this care will include child care and involvement with the child in schooling and other important events; it will mean full time fatherhood, with the child's welfare being my primary concern for a period not less than eighteen years.
- 2) be prepared, in the event that my partner and I decide we cannot care for the child, to help her find a suitable means for adoption. This will include going to any and all counseling sessions involved, and being involved in the whole process, including the child birth, any costs involved, and any counseling we deem needed.
- 3) discuss all the options involved for us, and be prepared if we decide that abortion is the best option for us, to be involved in the whole process, from beginning all the way through the abortion, and even beyond the abortion, if we feel that post-abortion counseling is needed.

If I cannot live up to this agreement, I pledge to keep quiet about the issues of reproductive choice.

The following men have signed this pledge, and we publically acknowledge and commend them for taking this action. We also commend the few who signed the pledge, but chose not to have their names publicized. It's great to see that at least some men are willing to take responsibility for their behavior.
