Cougars lose sixth straight; McFadden named MVP

Attempting to prove once again they deserve a national ranking, the Arizona State Sun Devils stretched their slim lead early in the second period on their way to a final 77-63 victory over the Cougars yesterday in Tempe.

The news was not all bad for the Cougars, as guard Ken McFadden was named the regionally televised game's MVP with his game-leading 27 points.

The loss handed WSU its sixth straight defeat, ending their two-game road trip to Arizona on a down note. Head coach George Raveling wasted no time in getting off the bench when, early in the game, a number of officiating calls enraged the Cougar mentor.

Scoring for the contest started off with seven-foot ASU center Alton Lister putting in an easy turn-around jumper. The Sun Devils jumped out to an early five-point lead and the closest WSU came the rest of the afternoon was 41-44 early in the second period.

With his impressive performance, McFadden led all scorers with his total. The six-foot, two-inch junior guard dazzled the 8,000 in attendance with his 20 foot-plus jump shots.

The Cougs first-half offense was led by Steve Harriel and McFadden. At one point the duo combined to bring the team within 5, at 21-14.

Raveling, instructing his team from the sidelines, called for a slow-down offense. With just seven minutes left to play in the first period, Arizona State was called for a foul. It was ASU's first, compared to the Cougars' seven in the game to that point.

Raveling jumped off the bench after one questionable call and was assessed a technical foul, his fourth in three games. The resulting charity tosses padded an already comfortable Sun Devil lead.

Arizona State, momentum in their favor, continued to build their lead, despite the impressive performance by McFadden. At the half-time buzzer, Arizona State held a 13-point lead, 40-27.

The Cougars came roaring out of the locker room, outscoring the Sun Devils early on, 8-2. The momentum had clearly changed hands and the Cougs brought the contest to within three, 41-44.

Capitalizing on free-throw opportunities, Washington State shot a surprising 8 of 9 from the line in an effort to bring the game within range.

Trading buckets seven straight times, the two teams started hitting as the Cougs trailed by six, 55-49, with ten minutes to go.

ASU stretched its lead to eight, in spite of WSU's hot free-throw shooting in the second period.

Attempting to set several moving screens in an effort to contain ASU's Lister, the Cougs were whistled down with a series of foul calls. It was the free-throw line that eventually extended an Arizona State lead to 71-60 with only 54 seconds left to go in the contest.

The 14-point, game-winning margin wrapped up a frustrating WSU two-game road trip to Arizona.

Arizona State shot a blazing 61 percent, hitting 31 of 51. The Sun Devils had 18 total turnovers, 12 of which came in the second half. WSU committed 13 turnovers, but only four coming in the second period.

ASU's Byron Scott, a six-foot, five-inch sophomore led the winners with 22 points. Johnny Nash followed up with 14 points and four rebounds, while Alton Lister contributed 13 points and seven boards. Two other Sun Devils ended the game in double-figures, Sam Williams adding 15 and Lafayette "Fat" Lever 10.

"Byron was shooting very well, but he almost had to open up their zone," said Arizona State Coach Ned Wulk. "They were doing a lot of the same things that they did in the last game."

The Sun Devils needed two

overtimes to beat Washington State, 62-59, Jan. 8 in Pullman.

"We got more breaks the last time, but we had our chances in this one," said Raveling. "We just let our shirt tails hang out too much."

Arizona State is only one game out of first place behind Oregon State. The Sun Devils lead the league in rebounds with a 42.8 per game average.

Raveling's charges drop to 9-11 overall and 2-9 in conference play with the losses. Although the Cougs are on the bottom of the PAC-10, their team play appears to be improving and they have been mentioned by several coaches around the league as being a better team than the record indicates.

The Cougars next games are at home, Saturday with California and the following Monday with Stanford.

Meanwhile, last night down in Tucson senior guard Russell Brown hit a turn-around 15-foot jump shot as time ran out in overtime Saturday night to give the University of Arizona a 68-66 PAC-10 basketball victory over the University of Washington.

It was Arizona's fourth straight PAC-10 win and gave the Wildcats a 6-5 conference record.

Brown, who finished with 12 points and 12 assists, had originally put up an 18-foot shot with five seconds remaining but missed. After a scramble for the rebound, the ball bounced to Brown at the free-throw line and he sank his shot at the buzzer.

Washington had taken a 12-point lead in the first half behind the 15 pounds of Bob Fronk and 10 from junior forward Andra Griffin.

Raveling wins title as 'Coach of the Year'

It was a big night for Cougar basketball when Head Coach George Raveling and his 1979-80 team were chosen as the Coach and Team of the Year at the 33rd Inland Empire Awards Banquet in Spokane last Wednesday night.

Shadle Park quarterback Mark Rypien was chosen as the Inland Empire's Amateur Athlete of the Year for 1980.

Last year's Cougars made the NCAA tournament for the first time since 1941 when they faced Penn at Purdue University in the first round of the Midwest Regional.

Led by All-American Don Col-

lins, Raveling's Cougars also managed their first 20-win season since 1949 with a 22-6 overall season record. Collins' selection as an All-American was WSU's first since 1974.

Rypien, who also received a trophy for the number one prep quarterback in the nation by Parade Magazine, has announced he will join Coach Jim Walden and the Cougars next season.

In three seasons, Rypien passed for 6,640 yards and 56 touchdowns. He was a three-sport letter-winner for the Highlanders with letters in football, basketball and baseball.

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
